MUSQUEAM 101 – stem? (what?) Musqueam 101 February 26, 2020 An Archaeology of Communities: Ancient Village Life in the Southern Gulf Islands



Dionisio Point, Galiano Island

Join us for an evening on the deep past of the southern Gulf Islands including Lamalchi Bay on Penelekut Island. Deep and rich Indigenous histories describe past lifeways and practices in the southern Gulf islands. Another window into the complex dynamics of these communities is offered by archaeology. In this talk, Colin Grier outlines how geophysics coupled with more traditional archaeological techniques can add to Indigenous perspectives on past community life, and how the current and future goals of descendants can be supported with archaeological research.

<u>Presenter:</u> Colin Grier is an Associate Professor at Washington State University and a Visiting fellow at the Peter Wall Institute at UBC. His most recent fieldwork is at Lamalchi Bay on Penelekut Island. He has also worked at many other ancient villages including Dionisio Point on Galiano Island.





Safe Drinking Water Monitoring Program

Drinking water monitoring and results

Several measures are taken to protect the quality of Vancouver's drinking water.

- 1. At the source, Metro Vancouver has a comprehensive system of testing raw water for quality:
 - Filtering and disinfecting the water to prevent or remove biological pathogens.
 - Monitoring the water quality before delivery to member municipalities.
- 2. Once water enters Vancouver's distribution system, the City of Vancouver further tests water quality from 53 dedicated water sampling stations. Water must comply with the health standards set out in the BC Drinking Water Regulation.
- 3. Additionally, the City's water-distribution system does not contain lead pipes. Lead pipes and components were eliminated in the 1980s and 1990s. We routinely test water flowing through our distribution system and can confirm lead levels are always within Health Canada's guidelines.
- 4. The City conducts field testing for physical and chemical contaminants. Bacteriological samples are collected and sent to the BC Centre for Disease Control for further analysis, providing another level of monitoring through a third party.



Sparrow's Flight will be held in October 2020 to mark the 30th anniversary of the Supreme Court of Canada's decision in *R v Sparrow*, the Court's first decision on the rights of Aboriginal peoples under section 35 of the Canadian Constitution. The decision has had a profound impact on the nature and character of Aboriginal rights and on the management of the fisheries, not just on the Pacific, but across Canada. This conference on the 30th anniversary will revisit the events leading to the charges against Musqueam fishers, the decision of the Supreme Court of Canada, and the impact and continuing possibility of the decision.

The conference logo design should follow the following guidelines:

- Represent Musqueam and our fishing culture
- Maximum three colours. While designs in colour are encouraged, the design should also translate well into black and white, as it could be used in different formats.
- Simple enough so that it can be reproduced and re-sized depending on its use e.g. flexible enough to be used in a range of media, including in print and on-line
- Sharp lines in the design are encouraged, as shading and intricate details can be difficult to reproduce
- Designs submitted on paper should be no larger than 8.5" by 11" (letter size)

Please include a write up with your design, explaining its meaning and inspiration, along with your name and contact details.

Submitted designs will be adjudicated by the *Sparrow*'s Flight conference committee.

The artist of the chosen design will be awarded \$500. Design will be for the exclusive use/ ownership of the UBC Faculty of Law.

CALL for PROPOSALS

Sparrow's Flight: Revisiting the Supreme Court of Canada's Decision after 30 Years

October 23 & 24, 2020

Hosted jointly by the Musqueam Indian Band and the Peter A. Allard School of Law, UBC

This **call for proposals** goes out to Indigenous community leaders, members, and activists, those engaged in legal struggles concerning Indigenous and Aboriginal rights, and to academics in varied disciplines whose work touches on the legal, social, and political implications of the entrenchment of Aboriginal rights in section 35 of Canada's *Constitution Act, 1982*.

In 1990, the Supreme Court of Canada issued its first decision on the rights of Aboriginal peoples under section 35. The decision in *R. v Sparrow* breathed life into the slim text that "recognized and affirmed" the "existing Aboriginal and treaty rights of the Aboriginal people in Canada." The fact that the first case to test this provision was a fishing rights case was no accident. Fisheries have long been a significant point of conflict between Indigenous peoples and the Canadian state. The fact that the case originated on the Fraser River, near one of its mouths at Musqueam, and involved Musqueam fishers, was also no accident. For millennia, the Musqueam had lived and fished at the mouths of one of the largest salmon bearing rivers on the Pacific, but decades of intensive commercial harvesting, calamitous damage to the river system, and a history of efforts to exclude Indigenous peoples from the fisheries, as well as the willingness of the Musqueam to use Canadian courts to advance their interests, led the parties to the Supreme Court of Canada.

In *Sparrow*, the Supreme Court recognized that the Musqueam had an "aboriginal right to fish for food and social and ceremonial purposes", that this right had not been extinguished, and that the charges against Musqueam fishers, including Ronald Sparrow, for fishing in violation of regulations under Canada's *Fisheries Act* infringed this right. The Court interpreted these rulings to mean that the Musqueam food, social and ceremonial fishery had priority over commercial and sport fisheries, subject only to conservation requirements. More generally, the Supreme Court ruled that the courts were to construe section 35 "in a purposive way" and that the provision demanded "a generous, liberal interpretation".

"Sparrow's Flight" takes the 30th anniversary of the Supreme Court's first statement on the constitutional entrenchment of Aboriginal and treaty rights as an opportunity to revisit the case, to reconsider its history, to understand its impact, and to explore its possibility. This call seeks contributions to a two-day conference, hosted jointly by the Musqueam Indian Band and the Allard School of Law, that revisit *Sparrow*. The aim is to create space for broad, meaningful discussions, and with that in mind this call goes out to Indigenous nations engaged in struggles over access to and control of fisheries, and to those whose work grapples with the colonial legacy that section 35 seems intended to address.

Call for Artists: Indigenous Symbols for Academic Regalia

REQUEST FOR SUBMISSIONS

Deadline March 16, 2020

I. Project Description

<u>Overview</u>

UBC is seeking to commission an artist (or artists) to design Indigenous symbols that would be reproduced in fabric/textiles on the academic regalia of the Chancellor, President and members of the Board of Governors of The University of British Columbia. This regalia is worn at formal academic occasions such as the Graduation Ceremonies on both the Vancouver campus and the Okanagan campus.

The artist(s) needs to conceptualize how to Indigenize the academic regalia and acknowledge the relationship between UBC and Musqueam, and UBC and the Syilx Okanagan peoples.

The successful artist(s) will work with a committee made up of UBC, Musqueam and Syilx Okanagan representatives to determine the final design and materials.

The deadline for the completed project (completion means design and any production or fabrication required) is November 1, 2020 for use at the Fall 2020 Graduation Ceremonies in Vancouver and the Installation of the new Chancellor (November 25-27, 2020).

II. Eligibility

Open to professional or accomplished Indigenous artists who are members of the communities of the Syilx Okanagan people or members of the Musqueam Band.

III. Budget

Remuneration will be available for design as well as production, dependent on the design, the number of artists involved and the production requirements.

IV. Requirements

The University of British Columbia has two campuses: the Vancouver campus which is located on the traditional, ancestral, unceded territory of the Musqueam people and the Okanagan campus, which is located on the traditional, ancestral, unceded territory of the Syilx Okanagan people, and as the academic regalia will be worn by UBC senior administration on both campuses, it is very important that the indigenous symbols reflect both distinct cultures.

• Materials:

Fabric that would complement the academic regalia; be suitable for multiple ceremonies on both campuses, light for comfort and temperature, and be transportable (light, not crease, etc.)

- Symbols to incorporate:
 - symbols appropriate to the culture and traditions of the Musqueam and Syilx peoples
- New regalia for the Chancellor and President may or may not be designed with the appliques on the sleeves and side panels.
- Emblems that could be included:
 - University Coast of Arms and Motto "Tuum Est" (which means "It is yours" or "It is up to you")

V. Background

UBC Vancouver and Okanagan acknowledge the traditional territories in various ways at the annual graduation ceremonies:

- a) welcome by representatives of the local Indigenous nations (including welcome by elders, drummers, singers)
- b) message in printed program
- c) flying flags on the stage
- d) leading the Chancellor's Procession with the University Mace on each campus, both of which have been carved by Indigenous artists
- e) Indigenous regalia options for graduating students and faculty

To expand the acknowledgement in a very significant way, the senior administration has requested their academic regalia reflect the traditional territories upon which the University is located, to be a visible and outward representation of the relationship between the University, the Musqueam and the Syilx Okanagan peoples; as well as provide Indigenous students with a sense of inclusiveness and belonging at the graduation ceremonies.

History of Academic Regalia

The tradition of wearing of academic regalia has persisted from the Middle Ages, when the first Universities were founded. The regalia varies slightly from one University to another, and within a University, according to the status of the wearer. The UBC Chancellor's and President's regalia were worn at the first graduation ceremony in 1916 and have remained the same design to the current day. The Chancellor's regalia is black with gold embellishments and the President's regalia is of similar design, with silver embellishments.

The regalia for the Board of Governors has historically been a blue gown with gold panels in the front, representing the University colours of blue and gold.

VI. Selection Process and Criteria

A Selection committee has been formed with representatives from both the UBC campuses, as well as from the Musqueam and Syilx Okanagan peoples. A subcommittee will be formed on each campus to evaluate artist's submissions, if necessary to seek guidance on cultural aspects of the submission, and either select an artist based on submission materials or seek more detailed proposals.

Selection criteria will include and applications weighted on:

- i) the applicant's professional qualifications and experience;
- ii) proven ability to undertake and complete projects of a similar scope;
- iii) artistic merit as evidenced by the submitted materials;
- iv) knowledge of textiles/fabrics;
- v) knowledge of the distinct symbolism and cultures of the Musqueam and Syilx peoples
- vi) demonstrated ability to work with public institutions in the creation of an art project.

Based on review of applications, the sub-committees will recommend an artist (or artists) to the Selection committee. The Selection committee will make a recommendation to the Senior Administration of a preferred artist (or artists.) Contract and project plan are to be negotiated with the Director of Ceremonies and Events.

Final design selected will be the property of UBC. The successful artist shall assign all rights of the design and its use to UBC. This includes but not limited to title, copyright (including the right of reproduction) and a waiver or moral rights. The successful artist will be required to sign a release to this effect.

VII. Project Timeline

The schedule is contingent upon the University's project schedule and may be changed at any time.

- Illustration(s) of proposed design. This graphic will be used by the selection committee to choose the successful artist but may not reflect the final design.
- If applicable, production scope including estimated budget and a statement about production process
- 3 Reference(s): Include contact name and phone number
- Examples of previous work: photos or PowerPoint files. Images must be clearly labeled with title, medium, dimensions, date of work and short description.
