SAFE DRINKING WATER MONITORING PROGRAM

1. HEALTH BENEFITS

We all know how important it is to stay hydrated, but it is not always clear how our beverage choices impact our health. Evidence links the consumption of sugary drinks to excess weight gain and an increased risk of chronic disease and tooth decay. The solution? Drink water most often! Make it more exciting by adding fresh fruit and herbs like strawberries and basil for a delicious hint of flavour.

2. SAVE MONEY

All UBC Food Services locations, including the Residence Dining Rooms, offer free tap water. When you are out and about, Metro Vancouver's TapMap is a great way to find free places to refill water bottles. When you consider that bottled water and other beverages are a 100% markup on free tap water, the math is simple: After the initial investment in a water bottle, tap water will save you money!

3. REDUCE WASTE

Bottled water vs. tap water...what's better? Water is universally better for you than sugar-sweetened beverages, but often bottled water is simply re-packaged municipal tap water. Opting for tap water over bottled water not only reduces waste from single-use containers and requires less energy to transport, but in Metro Vancouver tap water is held to much higher safety standards than bottled water. Plus, even recyclable bottles require energy and resources, and millions of single-use water bottles still end up in our landfills. SEEDS investigated the sustainability of bottled water vs. tap water a few years ago.



This is a distributed online learning program for grades K-12. Families with elementary-aged children enrolled in VLN in the 2021-2022 school year can request their children be enrolled in their usual catchment school for the 2022-2023 school year. Please contact the administrator at your child's catchment school with that re-enrolment request.

As we move forward, we also want to share some details about our ongoing work to build a stronger public education system. We are about to embark on a new Education Plan, setting our direction for the next five years as a school district. We will share more details, including our engagement plans, soon. In addition, we continue to advance our anti-racism and non-discrimination strategic plan to ensure all students, staff and school community members feel safe, included and celebrated in our schools and work sites. Additionally, our District will commemorate the National Day for Truth and Reconciliation on September 30. All schools will be closed this day which is a time to reflect on the tragic history and lasting impacts of the residential schools system in Canada. More details about how we will acknowledge the day will also be shared in the coming weeks.

For now, we hope the summer provided you with time to reconnect with loved ones and create lasting memories for all. Our collective wish for the 2021-2022 school year is that it may be one of growth, discovery and filled with the enthusiasm that comes with learning.



REPLACING IONA SEWAGE TREATMENT PLANT

\$10 BILLION FOR SEWAGE PLANT UPGRADE

The proposed design for replacing the aging Iona wastewater treatment plant will restore salmon and bird habitat, increase park space and reduce pollution - at a cost of roughly \$10 billion.

The Iona Sewage Treatment Plant is Musqueam 2's neighbour, directly across the river on Iona Island. Built in the 1960's, the plant was created to treat the sewage from the surrounding areas. Now, in 2021, the plant is in desperate need of repairs, seismic upgrades and updated treatment plans as the system does not currently meet federal rules for secondary treatment of waste water. The plant has created many barriers for the Musqueam community. Musqueam relies heavily on seafood such as crabs, eulachon, salmon and more. The treatment plant has negatively impacted the health of these culturally and dietary important creatures, resulting in a loss of food that the community has available to them.

The creation of the new treatment plant will hopefully allow for the culturally important seafood in the Fraser River to bounce back to a healthier state. At this point in time, the cost of replacing the treatment plant is at \$10 billion. Initially, the plants budget was set at \$1.9 billion, this estimate was out of date and did not consider that fact that the treatment plant was originally built on a sandbar so ground stabilization along with building on an incredibly small parcel of land, the budget needed to be increase dramatically. Along with ground stabilization and seismic upgrades, the new treatment plant will include:

o Improvements to the level of treatment from primary to tertiary to ensure the protection of water quality and the nearby marine environment.

- o Integration of the Iona Beach Regional Park.
- Restoration of fish habitat, protect bird habitat and enhance the terrestrial ecosystems located on the island.
- Minimization of odour.
- o Recover sustainable energy from waste water.

Currently, the Iona Treatment plant only provides a primary treatment of sewage before being pumped into the Georgia Strait. Primary treatment only filters out bulkier contaminants and sediments but nothing that is dissolved such as chemicals like CO2. With the addition of secondary treatment, the plant will be able to treat the waste water at a microbiological level and remove a considerably larger amount of waste. Although the new plant will have a smaller footprint than the original, it is expected that it will have an added tertiary level of treatment which is the highest level of wastewater treatment available. This final level of treatment would prevent toxins such as pharmaceuticals, heavy nitrogen, and phosphorus charged chemicals from going into the water.

Metro Vancouver is currently working with stakeholders, the public and local First Nations. Jerry Dobrovolny, Metro Vancouver's chief administrative officer acknowledges that the initial creation of the treatment plant built in the 60's was "at the front door" of the Musqueam Nation and without consultation. Furthermore, he hopes that the new plant can partner with Musqueam in developing and operating projects like a proposed district energy heating system that would generate energy from waste heat. He has also gone on to explain that the negative impact that the jetties and causeway have had on salmon migration and the effluent and microplastic from the wastewater system impacting the southern resident killer whales will be addressed in the new plant with hopes to help restore the salmon habitat.


The rebuilding of the plant comes with a high price tag but with good intentions. The current state of mind for the new plant is to add as many seismically, environmentally and, community minded protection measures as possible so the city will not have to rebuild an entirely new plant in fifty years. Along with the extensive protection measures, the project is anticipated to create around 100,000 jobs over the next 20 years. At this point in time, the plant is expected to be operational in 2034 and complete by 2042 with a final project report and design completed by early 2022.

VANCOUVER'S IMPROVED AIR QUALITY AND WHAT WE CAN DO TO HELP



Anyone living in the Fraser Valley knows that during the summer months the air quality is not something to be proud of. Due to wild fires, smog, increased traffic and a lack of rain or wind the air becomes stagnant and views become minimal to non-existent. During the pandemic though, the City of Vancouver saw air quality improve and pollution declined to levels not expected until 2050. The reason for improved air quality during the pandemic? Large reductions in traffic. As more businesses closed and more people worked from home, less cars were on the road. This led to a reduction in Nitrogen Dioxide (NO2) in the air. The City saw these reductions and wanted to share them with the citizens of Vancouver in hopes that it would prompt more people to use alternative modes of transportation. The City also created the Clean Air 2021 and climate action plans (Metro 2050 Vision).

Estimated Greenhouse Gas Emissions Reductions



The Clean Air Plan has three main goals:

- 1) Reduce greenhouse gas emissions by 45% from 2010 levels by 2050,
- 2) Ensure outdoor air quality meets air quality standards and,
- 3) Increase the time that visual air quality is classified as excellent.

To add on, the Clean Air Plan has 132 actions and the City is asking that the residents of Metro Vancouver read through the *Clean Air Plan* and to pick a few of those action items that are most attainable for them to be a part of. Some of those action items include:

- o Using alternative modes of transportation such as public transportation or biking to your destinations.
- o Initiating environmentally friendly programs at your school or workplace such as recycling programs, fundraising for solar panels and so on.
- O Changing your lawn from traditional grass over to native plants that will help local wildlife and absorb more CO2 from the air.


As more people make the switch over to riding bikes or e-bikes to get around, not only is the positive impact on the environment noticed but the improvement in people's health is as well. Dr. Melissa Lem, a clinical assistant professor at UBC, stated that there is evidence to show that people who commute to work may have more mood issues and have worse cardiovascular health. If you have the ability to walk, bike, or even take public transportation to your destination, try to choose that option as much as possible. Dr. Lem also stated that using the above modes of transportation helps citizens connect with their communities and after a whole year and a half of being shut off from family, friends and the public due to the pandemic, now is the best time to make those connections!

As we move closer to 2022, thinking about our environmental impact is critical to helping keep our temperatures below 1.5 degrees Celsius. The improvement in Vancouver's air quality just due to a reduction in traffic shows us that we can make a difference and should continue to do so. We don't need one person making perfectly executed environmentally conscience decisions, we need a handful of people doing it imperfectly.

POTENTIAL REMOVAL OF ENLOE DAM



The Similkameen River originates in Manning Park and is fed by the Tulameen and Ashnola Rivers. It continues on past Princeton, Hedley, Keremeos and Cawston before passing through the border into the United States. 101 years ago, the Similkameen River was dammed, negatively impacting salmon that lived in the river, Indigenous communities that relied on those salmon and wildlife that relied on the river as a food source. Sixty years ago, the power generating dam halted work, resulting in what we see now, the abandoned grand structure that is Enloe Dam. Indigenous communities and environmentalists alike have been asking for the dam to be decommissioned for decades. For good reason too, the dam is still blocking 560 km of pristine river habitat that could be the very landscape that helps start to restore Pacific Salmon numbers.

At the beginning of June, BC's Environment Minister, George Heyman, sent a letter to the state of Washington's director of ecology, Laura Watson. In the letter Heyman voices British Columbia's support for decommissioning the dam. The provincial government is currently working to study the impacts of removal of the dam. There is potential for contaminated sediment to flow through the river, once the dam is removed. As well, there is a risk to introduce invasive species to the river region impacting the beautiful native flora and fauna that reside along the banks. Despite those risks, the removal of the dam would have the potential to help restore salmon stocks that have been critically low for years.



Conservationist and emeritus of the Rivers Institute, Mark Angelo, strongly supports the notion that there were salmon in the river at one point in time. Angelo paddled through the Similkameen in the 1970's and spoke with Indigenous elders, Hedley and Cawston of the Confederated Tribes of the Colville Reservation, who remember seeing salmon in the river in the early 1900's. Since then, scientists have also found salmon protein in the river sediment, further confirming what the elders already saw and knew to be true. To solidify those statements, in recent years there has been videos showing salmon at the base of the dam jumping into the waterfall, attempting to make it up river.

Many parties would like to see the removal of the dam, most notably the Indigenous Nations that tie their culture to the river and rely on it for various resources. The Confederated Tribes of the Colville Reservation commissioned a conceptual dam removal plan and the U.S Geological Survey will be studying the issue of sediment loads with a report due in the Spring of 2022. The decommissioning of the dam would provide both countries an opportunity to work together to restore the landscape, salmon population numbers and relationships with Indigenous peoples impacted by the dam.
