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

We will not hand out fish to anyone except for those who are able to make it in person on those days. 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





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SAFE DRINKING WATER MONITORING PROGRAM

Providing clean, safe drinking water Metro Vancouver supplies drinking water for the Lower Mainland using a system of watersheds, dams, reservoirs and pipes. The source of our drinking water is rain and snow, which is collected and stored in the Capilano, Seymour and Coquitlam reservoirs. The Capilano and Seymour watersheds supply about 70 per cent of the region's drinking water and the Coquitlam Watershed supplies the rest. Management of the region's drinking water is guided by Metro Vancouver's Drinking Water Management Plan (DWMP).

The goals of the DWMP are to:

- Provide clean, safe drinking water
- Ensure the sustainable use of water
- Ensure the sufficient supply of water
- Manage and protect the watersheds that provide the region's water as natural assets

Seeking Focus Group Participants

The BC Dental Association is seeking participants for a focus group to inform the development of a cultural safety education course for dental office staff and oral health professionals. This cultural safety course is intended to initiate and support meaningful discussions at dental offices about health equity, Indigenous cultural safety, anti-racism, and reflection on how current business decisions impact the lives of Indigenous people.

You are eligible to participate in this course development if you are Indigenous and:

- You have experienced unsafe dental service experiences
- You have experienced culturally safe dental services
- You have had challenges accessing dental services
- You have experienced inter-generational trauma and have fear receiving dental services

If chosen to participate, you will attend a virtual focus group session with other Indigenous people and a professional Indigenous facilitator who will create a safe space in which to share your lived dental experiences together.

As an incentive to participate in the course development, you will be compensated at \$50/hour by the BC Dental Association. The focus groups will take place in late February and early March.

Participants may also have the opportunity to be recorded sharing individual stories, which would be featured as part of the course content.

You will need access to a computer with a video camera and speaker in order to participate in the focus group session and any recording.



MUSQUEAM BOOK CLUB - NEW BOOK!



She dreams of a fresh start at college, but when family tragedy strikes, Daunis puts her future on hold to look after her fragile mother. The only bright spot is meeting Jamie, the charming new recruit on her brother Levi's hockey team.

Yet even as Daunis falls for Jamie, she senses the dashing hockey star is hiding something. Everything comes to light when Daunis witnesses a shocking murder, thrusting her into an FBI investigation of a lethal new drug.

Reluctantly, Daunis agrees to go undercover, drawing on her knowledge of chemistry and Ojibwe traditional medicine to track down the source. But the search for truth is more complicated than Daunis imagined, exposing secrets and old scars. At the same time, she grows concerned with an investigation that seems more focused on punishing the offenders than protecting the victims.

Introduction and Executive Summary

Musqueam Indian Band ($x^wm \ni \theta k^w \ni \dot{y} \ni m$) is an Indigenous group whose core Traditional Territory lies within the City of Vancouver. The $x^wm \ni \theta k^w \ni \dot{y} \ni m$ people are the oldest-known residents of Vancouver, and have lived in the Fraser River estuary for thousands of years. $x^wm \ni \theta k^w \ni \dot{y} \ni m's$ administration has developed the Environmental Stewardship Department (ESD) to work on behalf of the $x^wm \ni \theta k^w \ni \dot{y} \ni m's$ Traditional Territory while under the direction of Chief and Council.

Scope of Designs

 $x^w m \ni \theta k^w \ni y \ni m$ ESD is seeking to contract a qualified $x^w m \ni \theta k^w \ni y \ni m$ Artist to develop a selection of digital graphic designs for an internal $x^w m \ni \theta k^w \ni y \ni m$ Application/Platform.

Please include a portfolio of previous similar work, and a cover letter in your submission. If you do not have digital copies of your work, please reach out and we can arrange a meeting.

- The contractor will work with $x^w m \Rightarrow \theta k^w \Rightarrow \dot{y} \Rightarrow m$ ESD to develop a set of graphic designs for a custom platform in development.

THE PROJECT:

TransLink is looking to commission three artists, one from each of the three Host Nations x^wməθk^wəýəm, Skwxwú7mesh Úxwumixw, and səlilwətał, to create public art installations at the Burrard Station as part of the upcoming upgrade project. The final selected artists will each create their own two-dimensional design to be displayed within the station.

The Indigenous cultural recognition art at Burrard Station will give Musqueam, Squamish, and Tsleil-Waututh Nation artists the opportunity to create three artworks at the station that recognize and share the art, history, and cultures of the host Nations whose traditional and unceded territories encompass the downtown Vancouver peninsula.

This project is a part of TransLink's goals to expand and strengthen their relationships with the Host Nation communities and create more visibility for Musqueam, Squamish, and Tsleil-Waututh peoples and their cultures and lands.



An artist from each nation will be selected for one of three two-dimensional design opportunities. The jury will select an artist for each location based on the artists' application. The locations for art placement are as follows:



Background

Britannia is a non-profit organization located in Vancouver on an 18-acre site with two schools, a public library, an ice arena, Indigenous Carving Pavilion and swimming pool.

Our vision is to be a catalyst for social connection, capacity building and integration of services in our community while celebrating diversity, and enhancing the life and well-being of everyone who lives, works, and plays in our community. We operate from a holistic approach and offer members a broad range of programs and services that engage different abilities and interests across the life span. Our approach is grounded in social interaction, social development, recreation, sport, fitness, arts, culture, education, learning, nutrition and community connections. We promote the improved mental, emotional, physical, and spiritual health of our community, recognizing that health is impacted by personal, social, economic, and environmental factors. You do not have to be a resident of Britannia's catchment (within Grandview Woodlands, Strathcona, and the Downtown Eastside), but you must have significant experience with and relationship to our community.






