

Benefits of Drinking Water

Keeping ourselves hydrated throughout the day is crucial to maintaining health and well-being. Sixty percent of our body is made up of water, and without it, we would not be able to make some of the essential body processes.

However, not all areas in the world have access to clean drinking water. The issue with this is that these communities cannot function well, and some may get dehydrated or sick from the lack of water or drinking poor alternative water sources

An average person needs to drink six to eight glasses of water daily. For places with more hot and humid temperatures, drinking at least eight or more glasses is ideal for optimum body function.

The $x^wm \ni \theta k^w \ni \dot{y} \ni m$ people are the oldest-known residents of Vancouver, and have lived in the Fraser River estuary for thousands of years. $x^wm \ni \theta k^w \ni \dot{y} \ni m's$ administration has developed the Environmental Stewardship Department (ESD) to work on behalf of the $x^wm \ni \theta k^w \ni \dot{y} \ni m's$ Traditional Territory while under the direction of Chief and Council.

Scope of Designs

 $x^w m \rightarrow \theta k^w \rightarrow y \rightarrow m$ ESD is seeking to contract a qualified $x^w m \rightarrow \theta k^w \rightarrow y \rightarrow m$ Artist to develop a selection of digital graphic designs for an internal $x^w m \rightarrow \theta k^w \rightarrow y \rightarrow m$ Application/Platform.







Opportunity

The Vancouver Warriors are hosting an Indigenous Peoples Night on April 30th to celebrate and honour the rich history of the Indigenous People of British Columbia. Our Indigenous People's night contributes to the NLL Unites initiative, which uses the game of Lacrosse and the League's influence to provide resources to learn the history of lacrosse and Indigenous peoples to ensure we honor, preserve and cultivate the culture of the game. Canucks Sports & Entertainment is committed to providing a safe, respectful, and positive environment where all fans, players, staff, partners, and community members are welcome regardless of race, colour, religion, national origin, gender identity or expression, disability, sexual orientation, and socioeconomic status.

On this night we want to recognize and honour the heritage of the Indigenous community, highlight the contributions of our past and present Indigenous players, and celebrate the culture, featuring local artists and performers throughout the game.

Prior to the game, the team will take warm up in a special edition jersey, as well we will feature art throughout our in-game presentations, as well as on collateral and in content leading up to and during the game. We're looking to find an artist to design two Vancouver Warriors inspired logos to be applied for retail purposes on this night of celebration. Partial proceeds of the sales connected to these logos will be donated to the Native Education College.



Goals

To have a local First Nations artist collaborate and consult with the Vancouver Warriors Brand and Retail teams to produce logo artwork to be featured on the night. INTRODUCTION

BCIT's new Health Sciences Centre (HSC) will educate and train future health care professionals to meet the growing demands of the BC healthcare industry. The HSC is a state-of-the-art learning environment that combines modern technology with collaborative teaching opportunities to mimic real-world medical environments. These authentic learning experiences allow our students to reap great benefits as they become ambassadors of patient safety and are better equipped to practice in a dynamic health care system.

The new HSC building will feature classrooms, laboratories, flexible learning areas, and one of the largest healthcare simulation labs in Canada. The vision for the new centre includes:

- A living laboratory for students, faculty, and industry to learn, innovate and co-create;
- Building that fully supports experiential learning across health professions;
- Provide flexible settings allowing for multiple learning opportunities for health professionals;
- Provide accessible and inviting student-centered learning and collaboration environments that support both physical and virtual activities;
- Landmark gateway for the campus that creates a strong identity for the School of Health Sciences, and integrates the Campus Plan;
- Support virtual connections in the province and globally to serve dispersed participants and cohorts;
- Achieve best practice for building design regarding inclusivity, accessibility, and wellness



OBJECTIVE

Our objective is to secure services of an up and coming Coast Salish artist collaboration or an up and coming Coast Salish artist to design art for the feature wall located in the heart of the HSC building. Preference will be given to artist collaborations including all three local Nations (Musqueam, Squamish, Tsleil-Waututh). The artist(s) is to provide an art piece in digital format that will then be rendered and applied to the feature wall locations by a signage contractor sourced by BCIT.


BCIT has a strong commitment to embrace Truth and Reconciliation and promote Indigenization throughout the BCIT community, by honouring Indigenous people, knowledge and culture, while preparing learners for success in a complex world through an education that is complete and relevant.

From the beginning the design of the HSC building has had Indigenous involvement. The building will tell a story as you move from the ground floor to the top floor. This design will express this movement from bottom to top and it will express changes through colour. The heart of this building will be grounded in work of a Coast Salish artist(s) to reflect those who have been on this land since time immemorial. BCIT has been guided by our Indigenous Vision (https://www.bcit.ca/indigenous-vision/) in all that we do.

The feature wall (shown in drawing below and highlighted in the following <u>Gopro Video Link</u>) is composed of two surfaces located on the east side of the upcoming new BCIT's Health Sciences Centre:

- •21650 mm (h) x 7800mm (w)
- •21650 mm (h) x 19400mm (w)


There are a series of glazing cut outs to allow natural light into the stairwells. These must be considered as part of the overall design.



The wall has 3 main goals:

- •Offer a navigational point of reference throughout the building;
- Create a positive and productive working environment;
- Connect the building and its occupants to local heritage and story that goes beyond the school mandate

The building colour scheme moves from earth to sky colours (i.e. L1 red tones, L2 green tones, L3 and L5 blue tones).



The wall currently has the following design features:

- It has a level 5 drywall surface that is ready to receive a vinyl graphic
- It is bathed in natural light from overhead skylights and has feature lighting at each floor.
- It spans all four floors of the HSC, and is continuous (the corridor is pulled back to create 'light wells' that allow the wall to exist vertically uninterrupted).
- The corridor ceiling surrounding the feature wall has audio speakers intended to play sound effects that will enhance the visual artwork (e.g. sounds of nature, or soothing music).

ART THEME FRAMEWORK

The following three themes have been developed to provide artists a launch pad for creative exploration of concepts that have a direct connection with this project.

1. Honouring Our Coast Salish Lands

The local Coast Salish culture is rich in history, language and deep-rooted traditions. Many generations have lived and thrived in the area, which brings an abundant knowledge of the lands and waters of the territory. This knowledge and connection to the environment is often explored through rich artistic traditions such as wood carving (masks, canoes, welcome figures), weaving (wool and cedar), jewelry design, drum making, painting and more contemporary arts such as fashion, ceramics, architecture and music. Coast Salish teachings, remind us to be respectful stewards of the land, air and water as we are all interconnected with the environment we inhabit.



The feature wall opportunity should honour and reflect the traditional lands on which the new centre is built.

2. Health & Wellbeing

The effects of the recent global pandemic have amplified the need for health and well-being in both workplace and educational environments. A fundamental aspect of health care is ensuring workers look after themselves, to enable the highest quality health care for others.

The school wishes to promote a sense of wellness and community as its heart. The building should command a sense of welcoming professionalism that encourages collaboration, support and individual pride and inspiration. Some key aspects of well-being include:

- 1. *Physical Wellness* Healthy bodies generally lead to healthier living. Physical wellness leads us to focus on healthy nutrition, regular sleep, regular exercise, and self-care.
- 2. *Mental & Emotional Wellness* Happy people often learn to think healthy thoughts consistently that empower and inspire. Take time for emotional management, emotional intelligence, relaxation, and healthy thinking, which leads to healthy emotions.
- 3. Relational Wellness We each need meaningful connections each day to be mentally and emotionally healthy. Relational Wellness speaks to healthy conflict resolution, social intelligence, effective communication skills, and the capacity to truly connect.
- 4. *Spiritual Wellness* This is measured by how you treat others. It is walking with integrity, honesty, fairness, compassion, gratitude, and selflessness. It could also include taking time for personal reflection and meditation.





3. West Coast Living

The HSC facility is imbued with West-Coast architecture of a high institutional standard. Significant themes of wood, stone, and natural light are prevalent in the building. A distinct colour palette distinguishes each floor with a different colour; the palette aligns with the colours of a natural forest canopy.

In conjunction with previous objectives, it is desired that the feature wall art creatively expresses and celebrates the unique aspects of our natural environment. Examples could include walking among forest giants, paddling on the inlet, hiking views from local mountains, ravens in the mist, and relaxing by a river on sun warmed boulders.

Artists can creatively express the sublime gifts of West Coast Living. It's an ever-changing performance of light, colour and texture, as the seasons come and go.
