

Be advised MIB Health is following the Updated BC Centre for Disease Control Guidelines with regard to Covid tests.

We are running low on all Covid Tests (nasal swab, gargle, and rapid tests) due to a recent surge in testing requests; more have been ordered but we are unsure of exact timeline on when we will receive more.

WHAT NEXT AFTER YOU'VE DONE YOUR TEST?

If you receive a take home testing kit from MIB Health, it is helpful to us to self report to the CHN or Covid Liaison to help you navigate through next steps based off of your test result. If you or someone in your household tests positive, the Covid Liaison can assist with supports (like grocery orders) if needed.

- The Community Health Nurse is available to assist with questions, concerns around Covid testing, and/or results.
- The Covid Liaison is also available for additional information and/or supports during self-isolation.

- Self-isolate. Stay, and sleep in separate room from other family members, use separate bathroom.



SAFE DRINKING WATER MONITORING PROGRAM

Water Talk - Drinking Water Quality in Canada

In nature, water is never "pure". It picks up bits and pieces of everything it comes into contact with, including minerals, silt, vegetation, fertilizers, and agricultural run-off. Canada's diverse physical geography--from its coastal regions to the mountains and the prairies, the northern tundra and the Canadian Shield--means that the characteristics of water vary greatly across the country. Even in relatively pristine areas, water in its natural state will likely require some type of treatment before it is safe to drink.

Drinking water in Canada comes either from underground sources (commonly called groundwater) such as aquifers, or from surface waters such as lakes and rivers. Most Canadians get their drinking water from public water systems that have to meet quality requirements set by provincial and territorial governments. In rural and remote areas, people may get their drinking water from wells or from surface water sources located on their own private property and are individually responsible for the safety of the drinking water.



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First Nations Health Benefits (Plan W)

Plan W is designed to meet the unique needs of B.C. First Nations.

Plan W covers 100 percent of:

- Eligible prescription costs
- · Certain medical supplies
- Certain over-the-counter drugs
- Some natural health products
- Pharmacy services

Plan W is funded by the First Nations Health Authority (FNHA).

Who is eligible for Plan W?

You do not need to apply for Plan W.

Your pharmacist submits your prescription claim online, and your BC PharmaCare coverage is applied immediately.

Over-the-counter medications

To be eligible for coverage for many <u>over-the counter (OTC) medications</u> you will need a prescription from your:

Physician, Nurse practitioner, or Midwife

OR

A recommendation from your pharmacist

For all covered OTCs, your pharmacist must submit a claim to PharmaCare at the time of purchase.

Contact the First Nations Health Authority if you have questions about your coverage. See general coverage policies for information about PharmaCare plans, including Plan W.

Note that FNHA clients are eligible for other PharmaCare plans if they meet the criteria for the plan(s).

Happy January Everyone!

Here are a few noteworthy items from the 2SLGBTQIA+ community.

British Columbians are now able to change their gender designations on the BC Services Card, BC Driver's License, BCID and BC Birth Certificates without the confirmation of a physician or psychologist. (News Release: https://news.gov.bc.ca/releases/2022HLTH0002-000056)

The Government recognize that this requirement created a barrier to accessing genderaffirming identification and, in too many cases, created situations that may expose gender-diverse people to unsafe and potentially traumatizing situations.

"Each individual knows their gender and we as government do not need a physician or psychologist to confirm what they tell us about who they are."

POSITION SUMMARY

The *Community Health Representative and Liaison* (CHR/L) is responsible for participating in the delivery of high quality health education to the Musqueam community, supporting the Musqueam Health Department staff in the implementation and coordination of health programs on reserve, and liaising between patients, families, the community, and health care authorities to ensure a high quality of care. The CHR/L also provides resources and support to the Musqueam community regarding COVID-19, through coordinating with the regional health authority (RHA) contact tracers to ensure culturally safe practices. This role provides vital prevention and public health related support, specifically in relation to COVID-19 pandemic.

PRINCIPAL DUTIES AND RESPONSIBILITIES

- Supports the coordination and implementation of Health Department programs affected by the pandemic and works with CHN, Primary Care Clinic, and health staff to promote health updates and services (i.e. COVID restriction updates, vaccine distribution, mental health services, NNADAP, etc.)
- Demonstrates a healthy lifestyle and is a role model for the community.
- Monitors the community for general health, including during epidemics and emergencies, by supporting CHN, Home Care, etc.
- Works collaboratively with Musqueam community, families, and RHA COVID-19 contact tracers to support culturally safe contact tracing services:
 - Supports contact tracing process by monitoring designated community members via phone to ensure that holistic needs are being met and isolation plans are being maintained.
 - o Problem solves community specific barriers to support contact tracers e.g. uses alternative methods of contacting individuals when one may not have a phone, etc.
- Ensures individuals and families understand COVID-19 precautions, developing specific procedures for the community with the CHN and sharing information on basic infection control practices to prevent any future transmission of the virus;
- Develops and maintains strong working partnerships with communities, health care providers, health system partners and relevant organizations to support coordinated care.
- Acts as a direct resource to community answering or responding to questions of citizens directly.
- Connects to the communities' away-from-home population/families in event of an outbreak.
- Assists in identifying accommodations in community that could be used, modified if needed, for self-isolation, and/or surge capacity.
- Assists community in ordering, receiving and distributing personal protective equipment.
- Provides regular reporting on services provided.
- Performs other related duties as assigned.
