COVID RAPID TESTS

WHO TO CONTACT FOR A (Take Home) COVID TEST:

o MIB Covid Liaison @ 236 688 4821

- o The Covid Liaison is available 7 days/week
- If you or your household are self-isolating and need assistance with groceries, we will assist with <u>essentials</u> for all who are isolating for the recommended isolation period only.
- If you test too early, there is not enough viral load to be detected on the Rapid Antigen Test; this is why health authorities are saying test on day 3 of symptoms.

Be advised MIB Health is following the Updated Guidelines from local Health Authorities and the BCCDC.

The Provincial Health Officer has stated that not everyone needs to be tested; those who are at high risk for contracting Covid should seek testing. If you feel sick, immediately self-isolate.

When to test Recommendation:

TEST ON DAY 3 OF SYMPTOMS

Local testing centres are still operating and available to provide rapid tests if you have your own transportation to get there. If you cannot, contact the Covid Liaison as we have limited tests on hand.

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WHAT NEXT AFTER YOU'VE DONE YOUR TEST?

If you receive a take home testing kit from MIB Health, it is helpful to us to self-report to the CHN or Covid Liaison to help you navigate through next steps based off of your test result. If you or someone in your household tests positive, the Covid Liaison can assist with supports (like grocery orders) if needed.

- The Community Health Nurse is available to assist with questions, concerns around Covid testing, and/or results.
- The Covid Liaison is also available for additional information and/or supports during self-isolation.

If you live in community, if you feel sick & are experiencing any symptoms & would like a rapid test;

GROCERY ORDERS: Please be advised our local grocery stores are experiencing shortages and some grocery orders are missing requested items- please note that we are doing the best we can with what we have access to. (Please keep your receipts from your grocery order and bring to Musqueam reception after your isolation is done.)

CONTACT TRACING & SELF ISOLATE:

- Notify your household members and or your close contacts that you have tested positive so that they may
 monitor their symptoms, and their loved ones.
- Self-isolate. Stay, and sleep in separate room from other family members, use separate bathroom.
- If you must share kitchen/bathroom, wear a mask.
- STAY HOME, do not visit house to house. This is an added precaution for our community to take extra care for our Elder's and community and to ensure everyone in community is supported and stays safe.



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SAFE DRINKING WATER MONITORING PROGRAM

Charlene Campbell-Wood

The Protocol for Safe Drinking Water in First Nations Communities contains standards for design, construction, operation, maintenance, and monitoring of drinking water systems and is intended for use by First Nations staff responsible for water systems. It is also intended for use by Indian and Northern Affairs Canada (INAC) staff, Public Works and Government Services Canada (PWGSC) for INAC staff, and all others involved in providing advice or assistance to First Nations in the design, construction, operation, maintenance, and monitoring of their drinking water systems in their communities, in accordance with established federal or provincial standards, whichever are the most stringent.

Any water system that produces drinking water destined for human consumption, that is funded in whole or in part by INAC, and that serves five or more households or a public facility, must comply with the requirements of this protocol.

FIRST NATIONS HEALTH BENEFITS (PLAN W)

Plan W is designed to meet the unique needs of B.C. First Nations, and is funded by the <u>First Nations</u> <u>Health Authority (FNHA)</u>.

Plan W covers 100 percent of:

- Eligible prescription costs
- Certain medical supplies
- Certain over-the-counter drugs
- Some natural health products
- Pharmacy services

Who is eligible for Plan W? You do not need to apply for Plan W. Your pharmacist submits your prescription claim online, and your BC PharmaCare coverage is applied immediately.

Over-the-counter medications: To be eligible for coverage for many <u>over-the counter (OTC) medications</u> you will need a prescription from your:

Physician, Nurse practitioner, or Midwife OR A recommendation from your pharmacist

For all covered OTCs, your pharmacist must submit a claim to PharmaCare at the time of purchase.

Contact the First Nations Health Authority if you have questions about your coverage. See general coverage policies for information about PharmaCare plans, including Plan W.

PROCESS FOR SERVICE REQUESTS

- 1) <u>Head of household (name on Rental Agreement)</u> are to contact Housing Reception or email **housingadminassist@musqueam.bc.ca** to discuss the issue.
- 2) The service request is made and sent to Maintenance
- 3) Before the visit please have the area clean, accessible, & sanitized.
- 4) Maintenance will to go to the house then report back to Housing Admin.
- 5) *IF any parts or services are needed <u>Wait for Housing Managers</u> <u>approval.</u>
- 6) When approved:
 - a. Maintenance will purchase/order parts.
 - b. If services are needed Housing Admin will have to contact vendors set up time and date.

Please understand that there is a time delay when it comes to purchasing/ordering part and when Housing Admin have to communicate with vendors.

- 7) * if necessary* maintenance will to return to the home to do repairs/replacement after receiving the part needed or the technician will be at the house.
- 8) Service Request Complete.

Emergency service requests to call (604) 269 3381 immediately day or night. Emergencies include – Hot water tank not working, furnace not working, electrical problems or major leaks. Please provide correct contact information when making maintenance calls.

MUSQUEAM HOUSING DEPARTMENT

Due to the COVID-19 isolation please read below to maintain your furnace and hot water tank. if it is an absolute emergency with either of these Maintenance will visit the house or a vendor. Please follow the social distancing (6 feet away) and have the area cleared and sanitized.

FURNACE AND HOTWATER TANK MAINTENANCE

Furnace -

- Keep the area around the furnace clear of any debris, dirt and dust.
- Check the filter <u>every six months</u> to ensure the filter is not clogged and is able to breathe freely, if the filter is clogged the furnace will start over working then the sensors will start failing.
- Please make sure that the filter is the correct size for your furnace: having the wrong size filter could cause the furnace to prematurely wear and malfunction.
- If you have a re-usable filter, wash it every six months and make sure that it is 100% dry before placing it back into the furnace, if the filter is not dry the filter will develop mold.
- If the pilot light goes out, read the lighting instructions and follow the step by step instructions to re-light.
- Check the battery in the thermostat frequently and change frequently, Housing Department do not provide filters or batteries.

Hot Water Tank -

- Check for any leaks from connections (TPR valve, drain valve or shut off valve).
- Make sure the tank is not covered in dust, debris or clutter.
- If the tank is in a confined space, be sure the door(s) are vented.
- If there is a skirt on the bottom of the tank, check and clean when necessary.
- If the tank shuts off, follow the Manufacturers' instructions and follow the step by step instructions to re-light.

PLEASE DO NOT DISPOSE OF ANY COOKING FATS, OILS, OR GREASE DOWN THE DRAIN!

The Musqueam Indian Band has experienced a sewer backup in two houses on the same street due to grease build up in the sewer lines.



WHAT HAPPENS WHEN FATS OILS AND GREASE ARE PUT DOWN THE DRAIN?

As seen in the picture fats, oils and grease that are put down your household drains cause problems further down the pipe as well resulting in a backup and blockages. Liquefied fats, oils and greases will solidify and clog pipes and contribute to blockages and blockages may cause a backup into your home.

<u>FATS</u> - DAIRY PRODUCTS, SALAD DRESSINGS, MARGARINE, SHORTENING, ETC

OILS - COOKING OILS (OLIVE, COCONUT, CANOLA, VEGETABLE) AND SAUCES

GREASE - MEET DRIPPINGS, LARD



When disposing Fats, Oils, and Grease:

- Pour all used cooking oils and grease into a small container so it can cool and harden.
- When the container is full, cap the container or cover it tightly, place in a bag to prevent leakage and put in garbage container.
- Dry wipe all pots, pans and plates before washing in sink or dishwasher. Use paper towels and wipe grease and food contents into a garbage container.
- If you have a kitchen sink garbage grinder, use this as little as possible since food particles and grease from the grinded material will still clog your pipes and affect the downstream sewer system.

The $x^wm \ni \theta k^w \ni \dot{y} \ni m$ people are the oldest-known residents of Vancouver, and have lived in the Fraser River estuary for thousands of years. $x^wm \ni \theta k^w \ni \dot{y} \ni m's$ administration has developed the Environmental Stewardship Department (ESD) to work on behalf of the $x^wm \ni \theta k^w \ni \dot{y} \ni m's$ Traditional Territory while under the direction of Chief and Council.

Scope of Designs

 $x^w m \ni \theta k^w \ni y \ni m$ ESD is seeking to contract a qualified $x^w m \ni \theta k^w \ni y \ni m$ Artist to develop a selection of digital graphic designs for an internal $x^w m \ni \theta k^w \ni y \ni m$ Application/Platform.

Please include a portfolio of previous similar work, and a cover letter in your submission. If you do not have digital copies of your work, please reach out and we can arrange a meeting.

RISC Archaeological Training Course



This past November 2021 x^wməθk^wəyəm hosted Resources Information Standards Committee (RISC) Archaeological Training, a course about finding, surveying, and recording archaeological sites to Provincial standards.

The course was held at the Musqueam Cultural Centre, with field visits to archaeological sites. Participants were from xwməθkwəyəm, səlilwəta+, Skawahlook First Nation, Tsawwassen First Nation, and Skwxwú7mesh Úxwumixw. The course was taught by Sean Connaughton, Ian Sellers, Ailidh Hathaway (Inlailawatash Limited Partnership) Richard Campbell (xwməθkwəyəm), Aviva Rathbone (MIB), and Kody Huard (MIB).

The Basket

For this issue the x^wməθk^wəÿəm Archaeology team would like to share details of a basket that was found this past summer by Cyler Point, along the shores of the Fraser River. The basket is incredibly intricate and rare, and the weaving is extremely technologically advanced—it has a zig-zag design that is not visible from the inside of the basket. The basket had been preserved due to the saturated muddy sediments in which it was found.

In early August Cyler sat down with Aviva Rathbone and shared the story of the day he found the basket. When Cyler woke up that morning in late July, he checked the tides so he could take his dog for a walk on the beach. He had heard a story from his grandmother who had once found a basket laying on the shore— he often walked on the beach and would find tools and ?eləwkw (belongings).

Here is more of Cyler's story:

That morning I headed out down to the beach and out to the sandbar, on the way back my dog kept playing with a stick – he then happened to drop the stick, and that's when I looked down and saw what looked like the top of a cedar hat. As I put my hand through it I noticed the bottom base was concaved in. It was the shape of a cedar basket covered in mud, I could feel the textures and rows on rows of mud and what felt like wood. It took about an hour to carefully dig it out of the mud and tar. When it was fully excavated it was clear that the basket was nearly whole, only two pieces had broken off including the bottom base. As I walked back along the shore I saw an eagle sitting on the post and watching me. I felt I was meant to find it – someone or something was there, maybe an ancestor. So many things could have gone differently that day, but everything happened the way it did because it felt like it was meant to be.





How old is the basket?

With the permission of Chief and Council a small sample of the basket was sent to a Radiocarbon Laboratory for dating. The results of the analysis came back in late October with a date between the late 1700's to mid-1900's. The most likely date of the basket being somewhere around 1798.



Update on the basket now:

The basket is currently being cleaned and preserved at the Laboratory of Archaeology, at UBC. The basket had been preserved in the muddy and saturated ground, keeping the material in its original state from when it was left by the person who placed it there.

This type of belonging is very delicate and so the preservation process involves slowing carefully removing the mud from the grooves and between the wood fibres. As well as keeping it submerged in water for an extended period of time, to allow the material to stabilize.
