

Covid-19 Liaisons Update



Musqueam Health would like to extend a **HUGE** hay čx^w qa to our Covid Liaisons: Luke Mathison, Daytime Liaison, & Danielle Harkey, Evening/Weekend Liaison!!

The Covid Liaison was often the first point of contact for band members who needed more information, felt anxious if they were recently exposed, or wanted some assistance while isolating (groceries and/or other essentials). The Liaisons would take on volumes of calls, texts and emails 7 days a week, provide up to date information, assistance and reassurance to families within Musqueam and living away from home. Especially following the holidays of this year, where Musqueam had it's largest surge of Covid cases, assisting the Health Department with contact tracing and keeping ongoing information regarding the Covid-19 situation within our community & arranging getting test kits to those requesting it.

The province has moved away from many of the Public Health Restrictions earlier this year; the Health Department wanted to extend the support of the Liaisons and see how the trend continued in Musqueam. We are happy to announce, that our Covid cases have seen a sharp decline since the end of April, and into May.

That being said, our Evening/Weekend Liaison has ended her contract with us as of May 28th. Our daytime Liaison will be ending on June

10th, and will be assisting our department with reporting documents until then AND will continue answering incoming calls/texts/emails regarding Covid inquiries until then as well!

<u>There is NO need to test for clearance.</u> Some people can continue to test positive for months after contracting Covid-19, but are not contagious to others.



Chief Joe Mathias British Columbia Aboriginal Scholarship Fund

2022

STATEMENT OF ACTIVITIES

The Chief Joe Mathias British Columbia Aboriginal Scholarship Fund is a nationally registered charity established in memory of the late Chief Joe Mathias to support Chief Mathias' vision of post-secondary education for all First Nation persons. The Fund is an incorporated society under the Society Act of British Columbia.

The purposes of the Society are to advance education by providing educational scholarships to deserving British Columbia First Nation students who are in financial need and who demonstrate merit, in order to improve access to post-secondary education so that deserving British Columbia First Nation persons can acquire the knowledge and skills needed to participate in a changing economy and society, including scholarships to enable deserving British Columbia First Nation students to engage in:

- Courses of study towards an academic degree, or a certificate or diploma, at an eligible post-secondary educational institution at an undergraduate level; or
- Post-graduate academic studies at an eligible post-secondary educational institution, wherever located.

ELIGIBLE RECIPIENTS

The Society will grant scholarships only to persons who:

- Are members or citizens of a British Columbia First Nation (or BC Indian Band) British Columbia First Nation
 means a band (within the meaning of "band" in the *Indian Act*) that is located in British Columbia,
- Are enrolled at an eligible post-secondary educational institution as a full-time, or part-time, student;
- Are pursuing studies that lead to a degree or to a certificate or diploma from that institution; and
- Are in financial need and demonstrate merit.

Preference will be given to candidates who wish to pursue and excel in academic pursuits with the greatest potential benefit to the welfare and advancement of aboriginal communities and causes.

Examples of Ineligible Fields of Study:

- Conferences / symposiums / workshops
- Professional Fees / schools
- Education at non-recognized post-secondary institutions
- Executive / Management programs
- Fine Arts programs

ELIGIBLE POST-SECONDARY EDUCATIONAL INSTITUTION

The scholarships will be provided to eligible recipients for post-secondary studies at:

- A public post-secondary educational institution that grants degrees, certificates or diplomas; or
- A private post-secondary educational institutional that grants degrees, certificates or diplomas and that is determined by the Board to be an eligible institution.

ADDITIONAL REQUIREMENTS

The Board may in its discretion establish, amend or revoke:

- Criteria, terms or conditions, that are not in conflict with the foregoing, or the Society's constitution or bylaws, that must be met or satisfied by a person applying for or receiving a scholarship from the Society, including criteria, terms or conditions that must be met or satisfied for continuation of scholarship payments; and
- Factors to be considered by the Board in the selection of a candidate for a scholarship that are not in conflict with the foregoing, or the Society's constitution or bylaws, and that may include academic achievement, personal qualities and character, interest and participation in post-secondary educational institution and community affairs, development of a program of studies and special aptitude and qualification for that program.


APPLICATIONS



While some thought that thousands of signs signaled excitement and big city living, others thought they were a tawdry display that disfigured the city's natural beauty. This deep civic controversy resulted in a turning point in Vancouver's history and a change to the city's urban landscape. Immerse yourself in Vancouver's neon history and enjoy the big city lights of Vancouver and catch a glimpse of the city from the 1950s through to the 1970s with this extraordinary collection of neon signs.






Vancouver is Awesome



Sound of Dragon Music Festival

June 23-26, 2022

Katajjaq (Inuit throat singing) and Khoomei (Mongolian throat singing) meet in the collaboration between Orchid Ensemble (Vancouver), Oktoecho (Montreal), and Anand Avirmed (Mongolia). Katajjaq and khoomei are ancestral throat singing techniques that reproduce sounds heard in nature – water flowing, the wind blowing, echoes in mountains, the calls of birds... Coincidentally, these are also major themes in traditional Chinese music. In addition, the two ensembles offer unique cross-cultural instrumentations. This concert is a hybrid that crosses between Inuit, Mongolian, Chinese, Japanese, European, and Arabic music and it will be the first time katajjaq and khoomei are presented together on stage in BC.
