

COMMUNITY HEALTH COVID-19 UPDATE:

The Musqueam Health Department Raise our Hands & say hay čxw qo to our Musqueam Covid Liaisons; Luke Mathison, Daytime Liaison, & Danielle Harkey, Evening/Weekend Liaison!

The Musqueam **Covid Liaisons** were often the first point of contact for band members who needed information, felt anxious if they were recently exposed, or wanted assistance while isolating with groceries and/or other essentials. The Liaisons took on volumes of calls, texts and emails 7 days a week, provided up to date information, assistance and reassurance to families within Musqueam and living away from home. Especially following the holidays of this year, where Musqueam had its largest surge of Covid cases, assisting the Health Department with contact tracing and keeping ongoing information regarding the Covid-19 situation within our community & arranging getting test kits to those requesting it.

The province has moved away from many of the Public Health Restrictions earlier this year; the Health Department saw the need to extend the support of the Liaisons and see how the trend continued in Musqueam. We are happy to announce, that our Covid cases have seen a sharp decline since the end of April, and into May.

THE COVID LIAISONS HAVE COMPLETED THEIR CONTRACT AS OF JUNE 10TH, SUPPORTS WILL CONCLUDE FOR THE TIME BEING. IF YOU NEED A COVID TEST PLEASE SEE THE FOLLOWING:

- Covid test kits are available Rapid antigen testing kits are free at pharmacies. Local pharmacies such as Southlands, Shoppers Drug Mart, & London Drugs.
- ➤ There is NO need to test for clearance. Some people can continue to test positive for months after contracting Covid-19, but are not contagious to others.
- ➤ COVID-19 Vaccine's: Get your booster dose | Rapid antigen testing kits are free at pharmacies. Current eligibility: Seniors and Indigenous people. Book an appointment for your second booster if you are: 70 years and older or 55 years and older and Indigenous. *Notify booking clerk you are Indigenous & over 55.



Community Access to Residential School Records

On May 27, 2021, Tk'emlups te Secwepemc issued a statement that preliminary findings from a ground-penetrating radar specialist indicated the presence of the remains of 215 bodies on the grounds of the former Kamloops Indian Residential School. Since this first preliminary report, a number of other Nations have released similar findings.

In 2019, the BC Archives acquired the records of the Oblates of Mary Immaculate, a religious order that operated ten residential schools in British Columbia. Using Article 31 of the United Nations Declaration on the Rights of Indigenous Peoples as a guiding principle (Indigenous peoples have the right to maintain, control, protect and develop their cultural heritage, traditional knowledge and traditional cultural expressions, as well as ... their intellectual property over such cultural heritage, traditional knowledge, and traditional cultural expressions), the need to include community members in the processing of the records was prioritised in the work plan of the archivist. The importance of this approach has been confirmed with the findings of recent months.

Access to the information contained in the records relating to Residential Schools is vital for survivors, relatives, and communities to know what happened at the schools, and to help with the process of healing. Made up of archivists from Tk'emlups te Secwepemc, the Ktunaxa Nation, the Squamish Nation, and the BC Archives, this panel will explore the methods being employed to transfer these important records, and the questions and concerns being address as part of this work, particularly concerning restrictions, access and use protocols.

Documenting Affect and Harm: Decolonizing the Archive as Communities of Self

This session will discuss an Indigenous SNAC (Social Networks and Archival Context) edit-a-thon aimed at improving discovery of Indigenous archival material dispersed to multiple (often colonial) repositories, and improving the SNAC platform's representation of Indigenous entities. Working with an Indigenous Advisory Board over the course of six months, the project team began exploring best practices around

entities in SNAC for Indigenous, Native American, Alaskan Native, Native Hawaiian, or First Nations individuals and Nations, as well as for colonial actors and institutions whose records hold relevance for Indigenous researchers. The session will discuss outcomes, such as a code of conduct and a style guide, as well as several technical and cultural suggestions made by Advisory Board members and participants to improve the utility of SNAC for Indigenous communities engaged in "transformative practice" in SNAC in the future.

Documenting Community

In the "Documenting Community" session, three papers will describe projects that take different approaches to community outreach that work to make archives accessible and relevant. The first will discuss applying Jamie Lee's Queer'ed Archival Methodology to create an online archival space for queers of Iranian and Afghan descent to show how this practice has been grounded in theory and examine the potential of this approach to empower marginalized communities in memory keeping. The second will describe using augmented reality, archival records, and GIS to create a walking tour of the forced removals of Black people in Cape Town, South Africa's District Six under apartheid that integrates physical spaces with virtual documentary evidence to reinvent the embodied and affective experience of the walking tour, while exploring its potential for application to other contexts of forced removal, recovered and contested memory, and ongoing justice-seeking efforts. The third will discuss approaches to collaborative outreach that involve multiple institutions as well as activists acting as curators for an exhibit on LGBTQIA+ Collections in Texas to connect and engage multiple generations, give voices to those who have been excluded historically, and connect institutions and long working activists connections with younger audiences.

One drop at a time – How to put out the fire in museums and archives, a Haida perspective.

Lucy <u>Sdahl K'awaas Bell</u> is a passionate Haida museologists, language revitalizer and Haida nerd with a passion for learning from her Ancestors. She has over 20 years experience in museums and archives. With her at the helm, the Haida have repatriated over 500 ancestral remains and many archival resources.

Lucy was the inaugural Head of the Indigenous Collections and Repatriation Department at the Royal BC Museum. She co-wrote the Indigenous Repatriation Handbook, advocated for the digitization and distribution of the 18,000 historic Indigenous photographs and brought a spiritual care practice to the museum and archives.

In her farewell speech, she graciously called out the museum for racism, launching an investigation and internal work to address the problem. She received the Sterling Prize for Controversy for her actions.

Lucy is passionate about learning and bringing her Haida knowledge to her academic world. She is a distinguished UVIC Alumna, having a Cultural Resource Management certificate and a MA in language revitalization. She is currently a SFU PhD Candidate focusing on Haida museology.



Book Launch—Knowledge Within: Treasures of the Northwest Coast
