# JOB POSTING ENVIRONMENTAL STEWARDSHIP COORDINATOR

### Regular Full-time

### **Position Summary**

Under the direction of the Environmental Stewardship Manager, the Coordinator will support leading the team responsible for environmental stewardship within Musqueam's Traditional Territory. The Coordinator will provide guidance and support, internally and externally, on programs and projects related to Musqueam environment and stewardship issues. In addition, the Coordinator will undertake planning and implementation of projects and stewardship initiatives related to the protection, enhancement and restoration of ecosystems and habitats. The Coordinator will also participate in the development of strategies and prepare a variety of reports and studies. They will establish and maintain liaison with a wide variety of internal and external contacts, including both governmental and non-governmental bodies, and assist in directing the work of consultants and staff on a project basis.

### **Duties**

- Assist and coordinate implemention of environment and stewardship plans and projects (workplans, budgets, strategies, etc.)
- Designs and oversees data collection and analysis strategies for complex research and policy analysis projects; analyses, evaluates, and prepares written reports on policy implications from findings
- Establish communications and coordinate reviews between internal and external parties with respect to work related to referral administration
- Identify, assess and evaluate data/information required to support critical decision-making processes within the public sector
- Coordinate staff (e.g. Environmental Stewardship Monitors, Analysts, and Interns) on various projects and plans
- Organize community engagement sessions, including preparing presentation materials and newsletters
- Review, analyse, and prepare summaries, presentations, and graphical representations of proposals and reports
- Assist management in preparing briefing notes, internal/external reports, summaries, discussion papers, factsheets, and other support-related material
- Lead or participate in meetings related to large projects in order to coordinate information for multiple departments across the organization
- Perform related duties as required

- Excellent analytical, problem-solving, persuasion, and consensus-building skills with the ability to work under pressure and independently within a team environment
- Exceptional interpersonal skills with the ability to establish and maintain successful and effective relationships with a variety of internal and external contacts
- Excellent time management skills with the ability to manage multiple priorities and handle shifting priorities to produce results within deadlines
- Strong understanding of Indigenous history and politics in British Columbia; cultural competency and knowledge of Musqueam cultural traditions and interests is preferred

### JOB POSTING ENVIRONMENTAL MONITOR

### **Full Time**

### **Position Summary:**

Reporting to the Environmental Stewardship Manager and Major Projects Field Coordinator, the Environmental Monitor acts as the eyes and ears of the administration on the lands and waters of Musqueam Territory. The Environmental Monitor does this by carrying out environmental plans where construction is occurring, including reviewing plans for managing environmental risks, monitoring worksites to make sure plans are followed, and organizing, tracking, and reporting on monitoring findings and activities. Additionally, the Environmental Monitor carries out various other environmental projects including research and environmental restoration. The Environmental Monitor will also review technical documents to identify data gaps and participate in vessel patrols and activities, as well as provide assistance to other Environmental Stewardship projects when needed.

#### **Duties:**

- Reviewing reports about environmental issues for a specific site
- Collecting samples (water, soil, air)
- Monitoring erosion and sediments
- Ensuring proper cleanup of contaminants (e.g. fuel)
- Recording observations from samples and sites accurately
- Creating reports based on sampling and observation records
- Reading maps and plans to navigate varied work sites
- Identifying and locating environmental features of work sites
- Reporting on monitoring activities
- Assisting with the operation and maintenance of equipment, including laboratory, field, and monitoring equipment
- Communicating effectively with project team members
- Reviewing technical reports and referrals pertaining to a specific project (such as Water Sustainability Acts)
- Patrolling and monitoring Fraser River sites with the Environmental Stewardship work boat





### LifeGuard App & How it works

When someone is about to use, especially alone, they can open the app and record the type of substance they are using and confirm their location. The app will hold this information, and a timer is set which can be paused or extended by the app user at any time.

As the timer ends, the app will sound an alarm, flash a light, and vibrate. The user must hit a button to stop the alarm and indicate they are fine. If they are unable to stop the alarm, a text-to-voice call will go straight to 9-1-1. This alerts emergency medical dispatchers

### **COMMUNITY HEALTH COVID-19:**

**Rapid antigen testing kits** are free for residents of B.C. 18 years and older who have a Personal Health Number (PHN).

1 kit contains 5 individual tests. You are allowed 1 kit every 28 days.

A test should only be used by people who develop symptoms of COVID-19 and want to confirm a positive or negative result. The tests are not suitable for international travel requirements.

### Pharmacy staff will:

Ask for your PHN. You can find your PHN on the back of your B.C. driver's license, BC Services Card or Care Card

A pharmacy should never ask you to pay for a kit. Members residing off reserve may now pick up a test kit at their local pharmacy.

You can pick up a kit for someone else, like a parent or grandparent. Make sure you know their full name, date of birth and PHN, the pharmacist will ask you for that information.

**Travel:** if you choose to travel and are required to selfisolate by the Canadian Border Services, this is your responsibility and Musqueam Health Department does not provide supports, please make prior arrangements with your family and friends.



# Housing Department offering annual servicing for natural gas appliances

Musqueam Housing Department is offering annual maintenance and safety inspection for furnaces, fireplaces, and water heaters.

## Turning on your furnace for the first time?

Follow the steps below for your safety and to check the furnace is properly functioning.

- 1) Clear area by the furnace and the vents- When there covered, your home won't warm up the way it should, and anything nearby could create a fire hazard clear the area of trash, old clothing or furniture
- 2) Check the batteries in the thermostat to see if it's working properly before you turn on the furnace.
- 3) Check the CO2 monitor
  - a. According to furnace installation experts, it's not just the thermostat that you need to test before you turn the furnace on; you also need to test your carbon monoxide detectors to ensure that they're still working properly. This is an incredibly important step, as unintentionally using a damaged furnace can release toxic gas into your home, and a carbon monoxide detector will alert you to such a leak immediately.
- 4) Clean or replace the filter
  - a. Clean filters Dirt and dust can be a big problem. Some areas that you should be mindfully checking each year are the filters, coils, and other airflow parts of the unit to make sure they are free of debris and able to do their job with little effort.
  - b. Switch out old filters for new filters. Depending on your medical conditions, household size, and pets, experts recommend changing out filters every two to three months. If you have respiratory problems such as asthma, you may want to change the filter out more frequently to prevent the buildup of pollutants that aggravate your condition.
- 5) Wipe down the burners with a cloth or you can use a vacuum
  - a. While your furnace is on standby during the warmer seasons the burners collect dust, which affects your furnace's lifespan. Cleaning your burners should be a part of your furnace maintenance checklist.
- 6) Turn on the power switch. The switch is located different in each home.
- 7) Check the breaker for the furnace
- 8) Make sure the gas switch is on on the system
- 9) Check the condenser pump
  - a. Furnace may not start because of the sensor on the pump.
- 10) Slowly warm up the home Quick temperature changes put unnecessary strain on your furnace. Leave it on for a few minutes to gauge its functionality. If you hear any weird noises or smell something, you should turn it off immediately.




To prolong your system's lifespan, you should request for a furnace maintenance annually.

# Washer and Dryer Maintenance

Since Housing Department has been receiving a numerus amount of maintenance calls on washer and dryer machines here are some tips to prolong the life of these two appliances.





### Washer

- Don't overload the machine. Use the appropriate amount of water for the size of the load. Wash heavy or bulky items in small loads since these are harder on the appliance.
- Wash the washing machine. Rinse away soap residue and buildup by running store-bought washing machine cleaner, or a solution of hot water, vinegar, and baking soda through an empty load.
- Prevent musty odors and mildew. Leave the
  washer lid or door open between loads to dry
  out the unit and keep it smelling fresh. On
  front-loading washers wipe down the rubber
  seal around the door after doing your laundry.
- Always use detergent made for high-efficiency (HE) machines, and use the minimum amount (more is not necessarily better). Regular detergents produce much more suds, and over time, can build up a film on the drum and hoses that become a breeding ground for mold, and may even mechanically or electronically damage a front-load machine.
- Check your pockets before doing a load of laundry.

  This will prevent having to change the debris filter.

### Dryer

- Do not overload. Overloading the dryer can actually cause it to breakdown. Your clothes need the circulation of hot air and when the dryer is stuffed, the air cannot circulate as much as it needs to in order to dry your clothes. Instead of reducing drying times, overfilling the dryer will increase them.
- Clean the lint screen before or after every load.
   Carefully remove the screen from your dryer, wipe away the lint and clean with a used fabric softener sheet. Clean the filter with soap and water a few times each year to remove any remaining soap and fabric softener
- Check the door seal. If the door seal becomes loosened, hardened, damaged, or worn down, replace it immediately. Otherwise, warm air will escape reducing the dryer's efficiency and causing it to work harder. Check the seal by holding a tissue near door while the dryer is running. If the tissue is sucked toward the door, replace the seal.
