Reclaiming the Past to Inform the Future: Rethinking Urban Art & the Coast Salish Typology Project.

Please join us to hear about Alexandra Peck's new projects. The first looks at shared Musqueam and Duwamish histories of urban expulsion and resistance in Vancouver and Seattle. She is looking at public art in both cities, to show how modern and historic Indigenous art installations are frequently located near traditional village sites—demonstrating how art provides a contemporary link to culturally significant landscapes. The second project is much more tentative, with an ultimate goal of creating a publication that details ancient Coast Salish artistic practices through archaeological materials. This project aims to raise awareness of Coast Salish art as a distinct genre, as well as to provide many pre-colonial examples of Coast Salish art for current-day Coast Salish artists, youth, and educators.

Presenter: Alexandra Peck is the Audain Chair in Historical Indigenous Art at UBC. She is of Mediterranean, Scandinavian, and Indigenous descent and her scholarship concerns Native tribes and First Nations in the Pacific Northwest.

2023 Dungeness Crab baiting-away pilot study field program

Field work employment opportunity - Extension

The Vancouver Fraser Port Authority (port authority) is proposing to undertake a pilot study to evaluate the efficacy of a Dungeness crab baiting-away technique, in response to Indigenous group interest, as an approach to reduce the handling of crabs during salvage efforts prior to construction of the proposed Roberts Bank Terminal 2 (RBT2) project. The following is a request for services associated with the field work component of this pilot study.

The port authority is committed to Indigenous participation in field studies, as part of the ongoing environmental and technical work for the proposed RBT2 project Field work for the 2022 Dungeness crab baiting away pilot study will consist of trapping and tagging Dungeness crabs (*Metacarcinus magister*), recording crab movements with hydrophone receivers, video monitoring of crabs using underwater remotely operated vehicles and estimating densities of unmarked crabs. The port authority is seeking an Indigenous community member as a field technician to support the existing field crew in completing the field component of this pilot study.

Role description

- Participate as part of field crew to undertake trapping, handling / tagging, and recording crab movements
- Participate in the deployment and retrieval of crab traps, hydroacoustic equipment, baited ground lines, and other equipment from a vessel
- Participate in the collection and recording of field data and crab measurements, as well as transcription of data from underwater video footage
- Shares, at their own discretion, knowledge, experience and insights related to the work underway
- Support with photo and video documentation of the field work
- Work in accordance with established health and safety protocols

Time commitments

- One field technician required
- Up to 26 days in the field between March and April 2023 and may include weekends and early morning / evening work
- Approximately 8 10 hours in the field per field day
- Up to 208 hours in the field and 10 hours of pre-field planning and training for a total of up to 218 hours. Possibility of additional hours associated with post-field data entry tasks.

This may include reviewing a detailed workplan for the field study and reviewing health and safety protocols. The employee will be compensated for any time spent in preparation for the field program.

The field technician will be paid on an hourly basis for their role as support field crew.

Proposed field work schedule

Project kick-off and orientation will occur in February 2023. Field work is expected to be conducted between March 1 and April 30, 2023.

2023 Dungeness crab baiting-away pilot study field program

Call for vendor proposals – Vessel services for 2023 crab baiting-away pilot study – Extension

The Vancouver Fraser Port Authority (port authority) is proposing to undertake a pilot study to evaluate the efficacy of a Dungeness crab baiting-away technique, in response to Indigenous group interest, as an approach to reduce the handling of crabs during salvage efforts prior to construction of the Roberts Bank Terminal 2 project.

Field work for the 2023 pilot study will involve the following vessel-based activities:

- Deployment and retrieval of crab traps, hydroacoustic equipment, baited ground lines, and other equipment
- Capture of Dungeness crabs (*Metacarcinus magister*) for biological processing (measuring carapace width and determining sex) and tagging
- Collection of field recorder data and video footage by use of an underwater remotely operated vehicle

Description

The port authority is committed to Indigenous participation in field studies, as part of the ongoing environmental and technical work for the project. Safety is paramount, with all work undertaken in adherence to public health safety requirements, including any related to COVID 19. The port authority is seeking statements of qualification, vessel specifications (including photos) and hourly rates for Indigenous-owned vessels and Indigenous vessel operators that may support field work, as described above.

The 2023 Dungeness crab baiting-away pilot study will be carried out over a period of up to 26 field days, where each field day may be up to 10 hours. Field work will be carried out between March and April 2023 and may include weekends and early mornings. Exact survey dates will be chosen based on the availability of field staff and the vessel operator, as well as suitability of the tides for carrying out the work.

Requirements for the vessel and its operator

- Large deck/workspace
- Experience performing environmental survey work
- Experience working on boats in challenging weather conditions
- Mechanical assist with capability of deploying and recovering commercial crab traps
- Must be appropriately certified by Transport Canada to operate vessel commercially
- Vessel operation / job safety procedure and practices, and the ability to accommodate additional safety requirements as specified by WSP Golder
- · Ability to work collaboratively with the project team
- Experienced crew is an asset
- Must possess sufficient insurance to operate commercially within the Port of Vancouver and Workers' Compensation Board (WCB) paperwork as required





BC CANCER BREAST SCREENING REGISTRATION FORM

BC Cancer Breast Screening provides screening mammograms to **eligible BC residents age 40 and over**. If under 40, a doctor's referral is required.

MANDATORY ELIGIBILITY QUESTIONS:

Are you currently pregnant? Have you been breast feeding in the last three months?

Have you had breast enlargement surgery, such as implants or injections?

Have you had breast cancer?

Do you now have any new breast complaints such as a solitary lump or nipple discharge?

Have you had a mammogram on both breasts in the last 12 months?

If the answer is \underline{YES} to any of the questions above you would not be eligible for screening mammography at this time. Please contact your primary care provides (family doctor, clinic, nurse practitioner or naturopath) to find out about other breast exam options.

SAFE DRINKING WATER MONITORING PROGRAM

Regulates temperature

<u>Homeostasis</u>, one of our body's basic functions, is often disrupted by the lack of water. One of the most considerable implications this has is that it affects how we regulate body temperature. The body uses water to cool off when the body is too hot through perspiration. It cools the body and lowers it back to normal when we sweat.

Too little water in the body increases heat storage and makes the person more vulnerable to heat strain. It can also increase physical strain when we walk or exercise.

Flushes body waste

Sweat, urine, and feces can only be formed using water. Water is vital in eliminating harmful toxins in the body. Many by-products of metabolism and digestion require water to remove them from the body. Without water, there is a high chance these toxins would stay in the body, leading to problems in our organs such as our liver and kidneys.

Maintain blood pressure

Blood becomes thicker and viscous when we are dehydrated. Dehydration often results in the kidney releasing renin, resulting in sodium and water retention in the body to correct the low fluid volume. If this response stays constant, it often results in high blood pressure.

Maintaining the right blood pressure is essential so as not to damage our arteries and prevent chest pain. Hypertension makes arteries less elastic, decreasing blood and oxygen flow to the heart, lessening the risk for heart disease. Decreased blood flow to the heart can also cause angina or chest pain.

Digestion

Water helps break down food to help the body absorb the nutrients found in food. Without it, most of the nutrients we eat would not be processed or used by the body. Aside from that, water also helps soften stool and prevents



constipation. Dehydration can cause many gastrointestinal problems such as constipation and high pH in the stomach, increasing the risk for ulcers and heartburn.

LifeGuard App & How it works

When someone is about to use, especially alone, they can open the app and record the type of substance they are using and confirm their location. The app will hold this information, and a timer is set which can be paused or extended by the app user at any time.

As the timer ends, the app will sound an alarm, flash a light, and vibrate. The user must hit a button to stop the alarm and indicate they are fine. If they are unable to stop the alarm, a text-to-voice call will go straight to 9-1-1. This alerts emergency medical dispatchers





Summary of MUSQUEAM DRAFT SUBDIVISION, DEVELOPMENT AND SERVICING LAW

Date Posted: February 3, 2023

PURPOSE

The purpose of the Musqueam *Subdivision, Development and Servicing Law* is to make sure that Musqueam is protecting our Reserve land, our use of Reserve land is well planned, we meet community interests in land development, we get community benefits from developments, have a safe and high quality of construction, and protect Musqueam against liability.

BACKGROUND

Musqueam's Land Code came into effect on June 5, 2017. Musqueam is now responsible for protecting Musqueam Reserve land and trying to minimize risks for people living on and using the Reserve lands. Managing our own Reserve lands gives us a lot of opportunities to make things better. It also comes with responsibility for environmental stewardship and protection, making sure that developments and buildings are in the right places, and ensuring safe construction.

We realize that in the past some Members, developers and departments may have felt they could build or do anything on Reserve land without any need for planning or permits. This is because the federal government did not properly enforce laws and bylaws or help First Nations plan and manage developments in the past under the *Indian Act*. The problem with this approach is that it has caused unsafe buildings, poor drainage, moldy homes, illegal dumping, poorly planned developments and a lack of community services such as sidewalks, street lights, trails, parks, sewer and water on many Reserves. Musqueam would like to work with our Members and with developers to do things in a much better way under our Land Code.

SUMMARY OF KEY POINTS IN DRAFT LAW

- No subdivision, service connections or development will be allowed without a permit.
- Permits will be required for blasting, drilling, drainage works, sewer, water, etc.

- A permit will be required for most types of construction and major renovations. However, certain projects do not need permits such as sheds under 200 square feet and minor landscaping and renovation projects.
- Permitting on reserve lands will be managed and issued by the Musqueam Lands Governance Office.
- Larger or more complex developments will require more detailed permit applications.
- Building inspections will be required to ensure construction meets Building Code.
- For large developments, developers will have to contribute community benefits of land or cash in the amount of 5% of the project value (to contribute: sidewalks, drainage, park/green space).
- Allows for Land Committee review and comments of any proposed project of development.
- Sets out the application and approval process. This is very similar to municipal processes.
- Minimizes Musqueam's liability.
- Ensures consideration of Community needs for developments and protects CP holders.

NEXT STEPS

The process for the *Subdivision, Development, and Servicing Law* is following the law-making process set out in Musqueam's Land Code.

The Land Code Committee is continuing to review and revise the draft law, along with legal counsel. We welcome any questions or comments. The Committee and the Musqueam Lands Governance Office will be finalizing a draft of the law along application checklists and permit requirements to bring to Council for approval in the near future.

COMMUNITY MEETING

A community meeting to review the law will be held between February 3 and February 24, 2023.
