Supporting Survivors and Families: Researching Residential Schools and Indian Hospitals in BC

Tricia and Shannon from the Indian Residential School History and Dialogue Centre at UBC will share about upcoming projects and ongoing work to support community research, Survivor requests and support for intergenerational survivors. This includes work on the histories and records of the Indian Hospitals in BC, updates on investigations on Missing Children of residential schools, oral testimonies and on programming and outreach that will focus on trauma and strength-based learning and support.

They will also discuss research on residential schools, Indian Hospitals, several systems of colonialism connected to residential schools, and on healing and cultural support. Current and ongoing investigations about Unmarked Burials and Missing Children at residential schools are opening access to information and records rarely seen before and there is still much work to do, to connect Survivors to their records.

Presenters: Tricia Logan (Metis), interim Academic Director and Shannon Robinson, Education and Programming Strategist from the Indian Residential School History and Dialogue Centre at UBC.



How Much Water Is Enough?

Since water is so important, you might wonder if you're drinking enough. There is no magic amount of water that kids need to drink every day. Usually, kids like to drink something with meals and should definitely drink when they are thirsty. But when it's warm out or you're exercising, you'll need more. Be sure to drink some extra water when you're out in warm weather, especially while playing sports or exercising.

When your body doesn't have enough water, it is called being dehydrated. <u>Dehydration</u> also can keep you from being as fast and as sharp as you'd like to be. A bad case of dehydration can make you sick. So keep that water bottle handy when the weather warms up!

LifeGuard App & How it works

When someone is about to use, especially alone, they can open the app and record the type of substance they are using and confirm their location. The app will hold this information, and a timer is set which can be paused or extended by the app user at any time.

As the timer ends, the app will sound an alarm, flash a light, and vibrate. The user must hit a button to stop the alarm and indicate they are fine. If they are unable to stop the alarm, a text-to-voice call will go straight to 9-1-1. This alerts emergency medical dispatchers





Our aim is to protect and advance the political and territorial rights of Indigenous people in BC. We support Indigenous Peoples at regional, national, and international forums. The UBCIC's mandate is to work towards the implementation, exercise, and recognition of our inherent Title, Rights, and Treaty Rights, and to protect our lands, waters, and resources through the exercise and implementation of our own laws and jurisdiction. The UBCIC strengthens Indigenous Nations to assert and implement their Aboriginal Title, Rights, Treaty Rights, and Right of Self-Determination as Peoples. The UBCIC upholds the principles and standards articulated in the United Nations Declaration on the Rights of Indigenous Peoples for the establishment and maintenance of a universal framework of minimum standards for the survival, dignity, well-being, and rights of Indigenous Peoples.


