

CALL FOR MUSQUEAM ARTIST



THE PROJECT:

The Oakridge Park Development Partnership is looking to commission a xʷməθkʷəy̓əm Nation artist or artists to create a public art installation at the Oakridge - 41st Avenue Canada Line Station as part of the upcoming Oakridge development. The final selected artist or artists will each create an original artwork to be displayed on the face of a structure located in the Transit Plaza of the Oakridge - 41st Avenue Canada Line Station.

TECHNICAL SPECIFICATIONS

The artwork will be located at the Canada line station on the corner of Cambie Street and West 41st Avenue.

Dimensions for art on the face of a wall structure in the Transit Plaza are subject to change, but are currently slated at approximately 54.3 square metres

POTENTIAL MEDIA

Any medium will be considered subject to Translinks safety and preservation standards.

ELIGIBILITY:

Artists must be from the Musqueam Nation. Accepting all levels of previous artistic experience. No prior experience with professional public art necessary. We encourage anyone interested to apply. This opportunity prioritizes local Indigenous designs from Musqueam. Artists are not expected to do project management for this contract.

HOW TO APPLY:

Your application will take the form of an Expression of Interest. This includes:

- Approximately 300-word letter of intent responding to the following question and how this theme of representation would impact your work and design: What does it mean to you to create work in your own territory?
- 5 photos of your past work
- Artist Bio (who you are, which nation you are from, your artistic experience, etc.)
- Please do not include any designs sketches for this project as we are only asking for a letter of intent. Any drafts included will not be sent to the jury. You do not need to apply for a specific installation.

Please submit by May 19, 2023, via email to submissions@hostconsultinginc.com. Please feel free to reach out to us before the deadline with any questions.

SELECTION PROCESS:

A selection panel of three community members from Musqueam, a representative from the developer partnership, a member of the project public art selection jury, and a project architect. The selection will review the submissions and select a finalist. The finalist will be notified after the process has been completed. The panel will be facilitated by Host Consulting Inc. but they will not have a say in the selection.

ARTIST DESIGN FEE:

The artist will be awarded a baseline fee of \$75,000 for a design concept. An additional artist fee may be determined based on project scope with the selected artist.

CURATOR & FACILITATOR:

Host Consulting Inc. is a consultancy group of three Indigenous women from each of the three Host Nations: Faith Sparrow-Crawford (xʷməθkʷəy̓əm), Salia Joseph (Sḵw̓xwú7mesh Úxwumixw), Jade George (səlilwətaɫ). They will be facilitating the process and liaising with the artists and TransLink to help progress the project to completion.

RSI is a fine art company specializing in commissioning public art for civic space.

Introducing the Garden Coordinator for the x^wməθk^wəyəm Garden in UBC

MUSQUEAM HEALTH DEPARTMENT | LAND BASED HEALING PROGRAM is pleased to introduce the new x^wməθk^wəyəm Garden Coordinator; Chrissy Lal.



Hello, my name is Chrissy Lal. I am so grateful to be joining your community as a garden coordinator at the x^wməθk^wəyəm garden in UBC. My heritage is Polynesian-Indian and my family is from Fiji, but my ancestors originated from the mountainous and fishing villages of India before they were brought to Fiji by the British. My hereditary name is Lata which was passed down to me by the matriarchs in my family. I learned Lata is the Sanskrit name for medicine plant and I believe that is why it is my calling to work closely with plants, medicine, food and healing. My grandmother's name is Ram Devi, and she was the first person to teach me how to listen and communicate with the spirit of plants, and how to grow medicine and food for ceremony.

Throughout the years I have come to learn that growing a healthy garden is similar to growing a community. Just like plants we learn from each other and pass our knowledge to the next generation, we take care and defend one another, and through diversity we build resilience together.

Thank you for welcoming me to your community where we will grow healthy gardens together.

DRINKING WATER MONITORING PROGRAM

Community Based Drinking Water Quality Monitoring Program Community Based Drinking Water Monitors (CBWM) play a key role in the Drinking Water Safety Program as the designated person responsible for sampling, testing, recording and communicating the microbiological quality of drinking water within the community. The CBWM is also responsible for distributing results and may assist with developing and carrying out a drinking water quality awareness program. The CBWM may be a Community Health Representative (CHR), Water Treatment Plant Operator (WTPO), or another individual selected by the Band. If a community does not have a CBWM, the activities may be completed by the FNHA Environmental Health Officer or an FNHA Environmental Health Technician. Environmental Health Officers train CBWMs to sample and test the drinking water for potential microbial contamination using community lab equipment (Colilert®). WaterTrax®, an internet-based data management system, is used to securely manage all drinking water quality data to which the CBWM, Band Health Directors, and the Drinking Water Safety Program (DWSP) team have access

LifeGuard App & How it works

When someone is about to use, especially alone, they can open the app and record the type of substance they are using and confirm their location. The app will hold this information, and a timer is set which can be paused or extended by the app user at any time.

As the timer ends, the app will sound an alarm, flash a light, and vibrate. The user must hit a button to stop the alarm and indicate they are fine. If they are unable to stop the alarm, a text-to-voice call will go straight to 9-1-1. This alerts emergency medical dispatchers
