# 49 years of the Musqueam Declaration

The Musqueam Declaration was signed on June 10, 1976 by Musqueam members and leadership. It declares and affirms our inherent rights to our lands, waters, resources and self-governance.

# What does the declaration say?

Here are some key quotes:

"We, the Musqueam people openly and publicly declare and affirm that we hold aboriginal title to our land, and aboriginal rights to exercise use of our land, the sea and fresh waters, and all their resources within that territory occupied and used by our ancestors."

"Our aboriginal right is to live upon and travel over our aboriginal lands, seas and waters without foreign control or restriction; to utilize, trade and consume all the resources and products of those lands, waters and seas. It is **our right to govern ourselves** and our communities, to up-hold and determine our own customs, beliefs and laws.

Neither we nor our ancestors have ever given up, extinguished or diminished our aboriginal rights and title by treaty or agreement with any foreign government or power.

We have never considered the bits of land called "Indian Reserves" as compensation for our lost rights and cannot consider them as adequate compensation.

We have never accepted or agreed to the right of governments of Canada or British Columbia, or their agents, to tell us how to run our own affairs or determine how we should live our lives.

We, the Musqueam people, hereby declare our intent to exercise our aboriginal rights, to restore to our own use sufficient traditional resources to enable us and our descendants to live as distinct and independent people in our own land."


"We announce our intent to **obtain compensation** for loss of resources and denial of their uses, where these have been destroyed or exploited by others, or where they cannot be restored.

We announce our intent to establish **control of our own communities** and our own resources in order to control, determine, and guarantee our future.

This is our aboriginal right; and a basic, universal human right."



The map below is included in the declaration and outlines Musqueam's ancestral territory and some significant place names. This boundary has never changed and these sites continue to be important to our people.



The Musqueam Declaration was signed by Chief Delbert V. Guerin, Councillor Mary B. Charles, Councillor John J. Point, Councillor Gertrude Guerin, Councillor Joseph R. Becker, Councillor Arthur Stogan, and Musqueam members.

The declaration is one step in Musqueam's long history of asserting our rights and resisting colonial control. We continue to be grateful to our ancestors for their leadership, which we work hard to continue today to ensure a better future for the Musqueam generations to come.

# MSTV UNDRIP Action Plan Annual Report

The COV UNDRIP Action Plan was passed by MST and City of Vancouver during May and June of last year. The UNDRIP Task Force, a partnership of Musqueam, Squamish, Tsleil-Waututh, and the City of Vancouver, has collaborated on an implementation 2024/25 Annual Report.

The UNDRIP Action Plan is a five year plan and this is the first annual report that covers the 6 month period from June to December of 2024. Future reports will cover a full year. The Annual Report provides a progress overview and Action Group level updates on the progress of deliverables of all 18 Action Groups.

Chief Wayne Sparrow said about the report and work to date:

"Our administrative staff and appointed council members remain fully committed to the deliverables outlined in our action plan. We are encouraged by the progress to date - UNDRIP implementation is underway. It's inspiring to be part of this historic journey."

Once complete, ?əyʻalməxw/lyʻalmexw (Jericho Lands) will provide approximately 13,000 new homes – including 30% affordable housing – and space for around 3,000 jobs.





### UBC / Woodfibre LNG Indigenous Governance and Conservation Fellowship

Led by Professor Jeffrey Sayer and collaborators at the UBC Faculty of Forestry, this research initiative focuses on how conservation efforts can better support and be guided by the leadership, knowledge, and priorities of Indigenous Peoples and Local Communities (IPLCs). This will be a comparative study and will include examples from several countries in order to enable learning about what is working and why. A major emphasis will be placed on working in close collaboration with IPLCs in each country. The full list of locations has not been finalised but the study will include locations in British Columbia, Indonesia and either China or a Congo Basin country. All researchers will engage in more than one country/landscape.

The research contributes to one of the most urgent global goals of our time: protecting 30% of the planet's land and oceans by 2030 (the "30x30" target). Instead of focusing only on remote protected areas, the work explores how active, working landscapes—including forests, coastlines, and production lands—can contribute to biodiversity goals, especially when stewardship is led by Indigenous and local communities.

One of the Canadian research areas will be around the Átl'ka7tsem / Howe Sound UNESCO Biosphere Region. The project aims to support conservation strategies grounded in both traditional knowledge and contemporary governance. Howe Sound presents a living example of how biodiversity conservation, economic activity, and Indigenous stewardship can co-exist and shape one another. Indigenous involvement is foundational to the work, both in guiding research questions and in co-developing scenarios for land and marine use.

Across field sites in British Columbia, Indonesia and other countries, the team will be guided by Sayer et al. (2013) and will:

- Partner with communities in areas like Howe Sound, the Nass Valley, and multiple sites in Indonesia to explore how conservation can be integrated with forestry, fisheries, aquaculture and extractive industries, in landscapes.
- Work alongside indigenous communities, for instance Indigenous knowledge holders to understand the future they envision for their landscape, and how research can support their leadership.
- Use visual storytelling, interviews, governance analysis, and data science to explore how conservation can be effective and equitable in real-world, lived-in places.
- Share findings in ways that are useful to governments, NGOs, and international biodiversity policy efforts, with a focus on inclusive and ethical approaches to conservation.

The Indonesian case studies will provide a comparative lens, focusing on similar questions
of land use, biodiversity, and community governance in fast-changing forest and coastal
regions.

### Who This Is For

We're seeking Indigenous graduate students who are passionate about:

- Conservation that respects and is guided by Indigenous governance, rights, and knowledge
- Working in direct partnership with indigenous communities shaping the future of their lands and waters
- Bridging research and practice—whether through science, storytelling, or policy engagement for instance following Boedhihartono (2012)
- Collaborating across disciplines and cultures, in places like Howe Sound, northern BC, and locations in Indonesia guided by Sayer and Campbell (2004)
- Tackling real-world environmental challenges with humility, curiosity, and a commitment to justice, Sayer et al. (2003)
- Students will be part of a well-established, international research network based at UBC's
   <u>Faculty of Forestry and Environmental Stewardship</u>, with opportunities for deep
   community engagement, fieldwork, mentorship, and policy impact.

### **Entitlements**

Students accepted into the program will receive funding to cover their UBC tuition – whether it be a MSc or PhD and a stipend to cover living costs.
